Bruce Parkinson '77. He joins **Jerry Sichting '79** who was a member of the 2012 Hall of Fame class.

Bruce played with the Boilermakers for four years of college, lettering each year. In his career he scored 1,224 points and 14 double-doubles. That career total ranks him eighth in the Big Ten, and he still holds school records for assists in a game, season, and career.

Craig Lewis '15 Cherishes Life-Changing Trip to Malawi

Then Craig Lewis '15 first arrived in West Lafayette to attend Purdue, he experienced a bit of a culture shock. As a New Jersey native, the Midwest almost felt like foreign land to him. Getting a degree was the top priority for Craig nonetheless, and he wanted to surround himself with people who push him to achieve that and his other goals. The men of Beta Mu answered Craig's call.

"I learned a ton through Beta. I'm a very social person and I've tried to keep that in me," Craig said. "Beta was a great starting point for reaching out and doing things you might not be comfortable with. That led me to being able to do a lot of different things on my own."





One thing that impressed Craig about Beta was the fraternity's commitment to supporting different charities. Craig will never forget representing Beta in Sumo Slam, which benefitted a local children's hospital.

"It was a big competition between the fraternities," Craig said. "I remember going up against one of the guys who was on the football team. It was an all-out battle."

Beta prepared Craig to tackle a variety of challenges in the real world. Craig worked for Skanska USA Building in New York City for about two and a half years, but he couldn't stop thinking about a part of the Purdue experience that he couldn't fulfill. Due to his family's finances being tight, Craig didn't have the opportunity to study abroad in college. Thanks to the solid career he started at Skanska and confidence he gained at Beta, Craig filled that void and then some when he decided to quit his job and travel the world for nearly a year. It was another major culture shock for Craig, but this time it left him wanting more.

After Craig returned to his job with Skanska, he combined his passions for construction, charity, and traveling all into one trip. Craig reached out to Habitat for Humanity about one of their trips to go to Malawi, Africa, in February 2019 to build a home for a single mother and her five children. With the help of his family, coworkers, friends, and Beta brothers, Craig raised more than \$3,000 for the build. He was joined by 15 others from around the U.S. on the lifechanging week-and-a-half trip.

"We went to a village in the middle of Malawi and were greeted by almost 1,000 people. They



sang songs for us and led us into the camp because they knew what we had done to get to that point with raising money," Craig said. "The family was living in a mud hut that was wide open to animals coming into it. It was dangerous. Their homes can get washed away. It gave them something that could withstand storms and the animals that are out there."

Craig always enjoys capturing photos of the cities he travels to and made sure to get plenty of them in Malawi. Those photos are worth way more than 1,000 words to him.

"They don't even have mirrors, so they didn't know what they looked like," Craig said. "I'm out there taking all these pictures and showing them to the children and the people who live there and they are cracking up."

Craig can't wait to make another trip like the one to Malawi. He's also planning a trip to a place that no longer feels like foreign land to him. Craig is returning to West Lafayette this year for Homecoming.

Memory and Our Mystic Shrine

Carl Plochman '46 passed on to Memory and Our Mystic Shrine on November 30, 2019. Carl was with his family company, Plochman's Mustard, where he rose to CEO and had a hand in developing the brand's distinctive yellow plastic barrel packaging—said to be one of the earliest successful squeeze containers for condiments. Carl's studies at Purdue were interrupted by flight training with the Navy. He remained stateside through the end of the war, but his flight training sparked a love of flying. He owned several airplanes and continued to fly for pleasure, including to and from his family's Wisconsin cottage, until the 1980s. Carl retired in 1989 and turned to civic work, including the C.G. Jung Center in Evanston, Ill. He was a serious amateur photographer, with a home darkroom and a lab for developing his film. He often took photos for the Winnetka Presbyterian Church.

Paul Baumgartner '49 passed on to Memory and Our Mystic Shrine on January 17, 2019, after living a fulfilling life. He lived one month short of age 95. He will be dearly missed by his friends, family and Beta brothers.

Charles L. "Chuck" Bavis '70, of Auburn, Indiana, passed on to Memory and Our Mystic Shrine September 14, 2019. Chuck graduated from Garrett High School in 1966, where he helped the Railroaders' basketball team win three sectional titles and was named to the Indiana All-Star Team. He continued his basketball career at Purdue. As a junior, he and the Boilermakers finished runners-up in the NCAA Tournament Championship. In 2010, Chuck was inducted into the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame. Chuck worked for more than 40 years in the awards industry, both as a successful entrepreneur and sales representative. He is survived by his wife, Carol Lee, two sons and daughters-in-law, and a granddaughter.

Shervin Sadighian '92 passed on to Memory and Our Mystic Shrine on January 22, 2020. Shervin was a hardworking and determined man and even more so a loving and caring husband and father. As a member of Beta Theta Pi, he made many fond friends and formed even more fond memories. Over the course of the last five years of his life with ALS, he reconnected his bonds of brotherhood with his Beta Theta Pi brothers. Even though Cory had ALS and no longer had a voice, he stayed virtually connected, all while watching his favorite sports teams, especially his alma mater. Cory's fraternity brothers have been a great source of joy and happiness amidst the suffering he had with this disease. Cory was most importantly a loving and ever so patient father and husband, and he will be deeply missed.
